
Habitat and West Willow Activities 2021


Feb & March

We continue to support resident initiatives and community agencies in our partner neighborhoods of Sugarbrook and West Willow. We are registering eligible residents for COVID vaccine clinics, supporting the purchase of durable yard signs to support community events and activities, discussing ways to provide activities for youth, planning ways to get ordinance information into the hands of residents – especially renters, and working on eradicating the pesky groundhogs that have taken up residence in the West Willow community garden.

April

Breyahnna & Sarah met with West Willow residents at the Community Garden to discuss the upcoming year. Good news: the groundhog family has been removed and we are looking at ways to build a fencing system to keep them out permanently.

October

On October 9, 2021 we helped out at the Pull Over Prevention and Mutual Aid Fair in West Willow. The Southeast MI Pull Over Prevention is a "group of community members that organizes regular free auto repair events to help folks avoid unnecessary and dangerous interactions with police and immigration." They host monthly events, and in October partnered with the NWWNA to hold the event in West Willow. In addition to free auto repairs, the event included live music by several local musicians, COVID-19 vaccines from the Washtenaw County Health Department, free pet supplies by Pet Pals Mutual Aid, free lunch from FedUp Ministries, and lots of local resources, including information about Habitat's programs.




