
West Willow Neighborhood Revitalization Plan Ypsilanti, MI June 2015











Overview of West Willow

West Willow is a neighborhood located in the municipality of Ypsilanti Township, Michigan. The neighborhood was in its prime during the 1940's when the Ford Bomber Plant was producing B-24's during World War II at the rate of one airplay per hour! In 1953 the plant began producing automobile parts until it closed in 2010. The loss of jobs in the area contributed significantly to the change in the West Willow neighborhood. West Willow is home to 1163 residential homes, most of which were built in the mid-1960s. Although there are no multifamily residential structures in the neighborhood, it has a rental rate of 31%, which is high when compared to the other primarily residential neighborhoods in Ypsilanti Township. There is one park in the neighborhood, six churches, and no retail establishments. The one school that was located in West Willow is now closed and is being used as a church. The New West Willow Neighborhood Association is very active, and is one of the oldest continually operating neighborhood associations in Ypsilanti Township. On average, 30 people attend the monthly association meetings, which are held in the local Community Resource Center. See Appendix for West Willow Neighborhood demographics.

Overview of Habitat's Involvement in West Willow

Habitat for Humanity of Huron Valley's (Habitat) mission is to enrich our community through a legacy of affordable homeownership. Since starting in 1989, Habitat's core activity has been building or renovating homes and selling them with a zero-percent interest loan to low-income families in Washtenaw County, Michigan. In 2006, Habitat's Board of Directors, staff, and volunteers embarked on a strategic planning process to increase our capacity, with a goal of increasing the number of affordable homeownership units we provide annually to 20 per year by the year 2020. As part of our plan for growth, we began renovating foreclosed properties instead of building new homes, and since 2009 we have exclusively been renovating homes. In 2011 Habitat joined Habitat for Humanity International's Neighborhood Revitalization Initiative with the goal of serving more families by responding to community aspirations with an expanded array of products, services, and partnerships, with the mission of empowering residents to revive their neighborhoods and enhance the quality of life.

In November 2013, the board of the New West Willow Neighborhood Association (NWWNA) approached Habitat to discuss how we could partner in their community. The NWWNA is a 501(c)(3) with elected officers. Their board meets monthly, and they report on activities during the monthly neighborhood watch meeting. Habitat and the NWWNA agreed to partner on neighborhood revitalization activities in West Willow.

Resident Engagement & Community Planning Process

Habitat hired a full-time West Willow Community Development Coordinator, and in March 2014 she and other Habitat staff began meeting regularly with the New West Willow Neighborhood Association, the Washtenaw County Office of Community and Economic Development, and students from the University of Michigan who were participating in an interdisciplinary project called Michigan Engaging Community through the Classroom. This team began by developing a newsletter that was mailed to all West Willow residents in May 2014 introducing the NWWNA board to the community and outlining activities and programs that residents could participate in. This team strengthened existing partnerships and formed new relationships with many agencies, including those listed here.








West Willow Community Resident Survey Preliminary Update


November 17, 2014

Habitat for Humanity, the New West Willow Neighborhood Association, and resident volunteers began distributing the Community Resident Survey at the beginning of October. Thus far 130 surveys have been collected, meaning we are 45% of the way to our goal of 289 surveys. The information below represents some of the most important data collected in the surveys collected thus far as well as feedback received during the two previous community planning meetings. While the results are preliminary, they seem to be consistent enough to begin talking about.


How satisfied are you living in West Willow?




How likely are you to recommend this neighborhood as a good place to live?

Exterior Home Improvement Projects

Dates: August 20, 2014 and September 11, 2014

- On Wednesday August 20, 2014, we completed Exterior Home Improvement projects at 17 owner-occupied homes on streets in the northwest section of the neighborhood. Selected participants were homeowners earning less than 80% of the Area Median Income who were current with their mortgage, property tax, and homeowner's insurance payments. Repairs included improving grading, installing downspout extensions and splash blocks, cleaning gutters & installing gutter guards, painting, landscaping, and other minor repairs. The University of Michigan's Executive MBA Program provided 105 student volunteers for the Exterior Home Improvement Projects as their Citizenship Day project. Homeowners also helped out with the work on their homes. # of People Engaged: 150
- On Thursday September 11, 2014 we completed three Exterior Home Improvement projects. Ford Volunteer Corps provided the volunteers for this day. # of People Engaged: 35

Success Measures Resident Satisfaction Surveys

Dates: October 1 – December 31, 2014

- We worked with community residents and other volunteer groups from the Washtenaw County Sheriff's Office Outreach Team, and U of M School of Public Health to conduct door-to-door surveys using the Success Measures Resident Satisfaction Survey. We used the base Resident Satisfaction Survey provided by Success Measures and added questions around community gardening, health, and social interactions as suggested by the NWWNA board, University of Michigan School of Public Health, Washtenaw County Public Health, and Washtenaw County Office of Community and Economic Development.
- This was first-round data collection, and the results were entered into the Success Measures database. With a neighborhood of 1163 households, to have a margin of error of 5%, and a confidence level of 95%, we needed to collect 289 surveys. We administered surveys over 25 days, and collected 212 surveys, which is a 6.09% margin of error. Although the recommended sample size was not obtained, the results are still meaningful and support what was heard at the planning meetings.

Replace Fence along Bike Path/McCartney Street

Dates: October 17, October 18, October 25, November 8, 2014

- We replaced approximately 435 feet of privacy fence in the rear yards of seven properties near the walking/bike path that runs along McCartney Street. Several of the fence sections were covered with overgrowth which was cleared, revealing lots of trash that was hauled away. We removed the existing fence panels and rotted posts and then installed new 6 foot high spruce fence panels.
- Volunteers from Lowe's, Beta Alpha Psi at Eastern Michigan University, Domino's, Arbor Research, and the Washtenaw County Sheriff's Office, along with neighborhood residents volunteered on the project. # of People Engaged: 72.





Before After

Habitat for Humanity of Huron Valley Rehab at 1210 Desoto Avenue

Dates: October 16 – 17, October 25, and November 1, 2014

- We kicked-off the rehab of our first home in West Willow on Thursday October 16, 2014 with a morning program which included speakers from Habitat, Lowe's, and Kim Montgomery, a West Willow partner family. Over 30 people attended the kick-off, including staff from State Senator Rebekah Warren's office and officials from Ypsilanti Township, and the ceremony which ended with a ground-breaking activity with the jackhammer!
- Volunteers groups from Lowe's, DTE, Phi Sigma Phi at Eastern Michigan University and neighborhood residents worked over four days on the renovation work which included breaking up and removing a 12 ft x 12 ft concrete patio; removing all debris from inside the home; removing the trim, interior doors, and storm doors; removing the closet doors and shelving; removing the interior light fixtures and switch plates; removing English ivy that was climbing up the outside walls and throughout the lawn; and removing the kitchen appliances and cabinets. # of People Engaged: 80
- This included 8 Lowe's Heroes who contributed 56 volunteer hours.

Neighborhood Clean-Up & Beautification Day Date: Saturday November 8, 2014

 On November 8, 2014 we held a Neighborhood clean-up and beautification day which included raking leaves at several neighborhood homes, planting flower bulbs, cleaning up around the Community Resource Center and the entrance signs to the neighborhood, and picking up debris and litter around the neighborhood. # of People Engaged: 16.



Neighborhood Priorities

Input from the door-to-door Resident Satisfaction Surveys and Community Meetings resulted in priority areas that residents wish to address, and action teams have been formed to work on these initiatives. Below is a summary prepared after the November 17 Community Planning Meeting outlining those priorities.

West Willow Community Planning Meeting Update

Meeting Held November 17, 2014 at New Covenant Missionary Baptist Church

Meeting Summary

Monday evening, November 17, the NWWNA and Habitat for Humanity of Huron Valley hosted a great Community Planning Meeting at the New Covenant Missionary Baptist Church. Over 50 residents came out to hear preliminary results of the Community Resident Survey and develop ideas for how to move forward on some of the issues most important to residents. To develop these ideas, residents broke out into action teams based on areas of concern. Below are brief summaries of each group's meeting report.

Resident Action Team Reports

Drug Activity

This group suggested sitting down This group suggested further with police to talk, get advice, and development of vacant sites a plan for what residents can do to help rid the neighborhood of drugs. Residents also suggested a neighborhood watch block captain and doing research into how other communities have been successful at getting rid of drugs.

If this was no longer in our neighborhood we would see people outside more, which makes West Willow an overall more inviting place.

Poor Street Maintenance & Lighting and Litter, Trash, and Debris

These two groups combined. They suggested more people leave outside lights on at night to make the neighborhood more well-lit. From the township, the group wants a street cleaner schedule to make sure it comes through the neighborhood regularly and fines for not keeping clean yards.

Resolving these issues means a neighborhood with clean street drains and yards; a neighborhood that people feel more safe in.

Access to Amenities

near West Willow. Of particular importance are Gault Village and Liberty Square. These residents want to get in touch with officials as the property owners, to talk about potential tenants.

If development moved forward, this group imagines things like a grocery store, hardware store, or laundromat more nearby to West Willow.

Youth

This group focused on neighborhood churches providing resources to better the youth experience. New Covenant's tutoring program is one such example, but we need more. Also mentioned was reaching out to scouts, fraternal organizations, the American Legion, etc. who may have formal youth programming.

With success of these programs, this group envisions that West Willow would "get our youth back" from the poor influences that can distract them.

Vandalism/Break-Ins

This group focused on the youth element of this issue, looking to get parents and kids more engaged in the neighborhood through familyfriendly activities. Youth also need to both be shown tough love when at the township and county, as well they make mistakes and rewarded for making good decisions.

> If vandalism and break-ins were no longer a problem, this group envisions the Sheriff's monthly NWWNA meeting report to have "nothing to report."

Neighbor Relationships

This group wants to see more community activities such as block parties and yard sales put together for people to talk to one another. Specifically, this group suggested that Christmas Caroling would be a fun winter activity. The strategy of "each 1 needs to reach 1," bringing another resident to an event was also highlighted.

If these strategies worked, the neighborhood would see better relationships, more peace and contentment, and less crime in West Willow.

Habitat's Continued Role in West Willow

Habitat for Humanity of Huron Valley will continue to provide housing products in West Willow for at least the next three years. Habitat will continue to provide a dedication staff liaison to West Willow and will support the efforts of the neighborhood residents in carrying out the actions that are important to the community. Habitat will continue to consult with residents, share expertise, and connect residents with other agencies and resources. Habitat will continue to attend monthly Neighborhood Watch meetings and to encourage participants in Habitat programs to get engaged in the community.

Since 2014 Habitat and its partners have made a tremendous investment in West Willow through several housing programs:

- 2 previously foreclosed homes have been renovated and sold to new Habitat families
- 3 additional previously foreclosed homes are owned by Habitat and will be renovated and sold to low income families
- 224 non-Habitat families already living in West Willow participated in a Habitat Home Improvement Program
 - 3 Weatherizations
 - 4 Critical Repairs for Veterans
 - 30 Furnaces Replaced
 - 26 Furnaces Tested and Tuned up
 - 113 Refrigerators Replaced
 - 12 Insulation Projects
 - 48 Exterior Home Improvements

APPENDIX

West Willow Neighborhood History & Demographics

(Unless otherwise noted, all data has been obtained from the U.S. Census Bureau)

Population by quantity: Overall population based on 2010 U.S Census for the West Willow Census Tract 412300 is 2,928. The most prevalent race is black, which represents 72.47% of total population. 21.89% of the population is white.

Population by gender: Population by Age:

Male 45.77% Average age is 32.90 years old

Female 54.23% (0-34): 52.6% (35-64): 35.76%

(65-85+): 11.64%

Education: Among residents over the age of 25 in the neighborhood 15.97% have less than a high school education, compared to 14.28% in the U.S. 29.58% are high school graduates, compared to 28.24% in U.S. 38.42% have some college or Associates Degree, compared to 29% in U.S. 12.59% have a Bachelor's degree, compared to 17.88% in U.S. 3.43% have an advanced degree, compared to 10.61% in U.S.

Income: The median household income for census tract 412300 (West Willow) is \$39,423 compared to the U.S at \$53,046.

Unemployment: For men aged 16 or older, 27% are unemployed. Females 16 or older, 7% are unemployed. Many in the West Willow population are not in the labor force, meaning they are elderly, young, homemakers or are unwilling or unable to engage in productive activities for assorted reasons.

Home Values: Current median home value in West Willow is \$101,632 with the national average being \$172, 300. Most homes were built between 1960 and 1969. 93% are single family homes with 3-4 bedrooms.

Homeownership: Owner-occupied housing units in the neighborhood comprise 68.7% of the 1,160 housing units in the neighborhood. Renter-occupied housing units comprise 31.3% and vacant housing units comprise 5.2% of the remaining units in 2010. The average homeownership trend in the area is down 4.2% over the last five years.

Ethnicity: In 2010 the ethnic makeup of the neighborhood was 72.47% African American, 21.89% White and 2.77% Hispanic.

Crime: West Willow neighborhood receives police services from the Washtenaw County Sheriff's Department. Comparing West Willow to neighboring Gault Village through CrimeMapping.com: between June 13, 2013 and June 14, 2014 the Gault Village neighborhood had an occurrence of 14 crimes. Between 6/13/2013 & 6/13/2014 West Willow had an occurrence of 73 crimes. Between 6/13/2013 & 6/13/2014 Sugarbrook had an occurrence of 68 crimes. A same radius are of ½ mile was applied to each neighborhood. Most crimes happening in the WW neighborhood is breaking and entering done by juveniles.

Notable & Unique neighborhood characteristics:


Analysis done by NeighborhoodScout revealed that the West Willow neighborhood has more single mother households than 97.4% of neighborhoods in the U.S. This is a strong indicator of social and family issues such as poverty, high rate of high school dropouts and truancy, crime and other societal problems. Many community leaders and residents state that the lack of constructive activities for juveniles has attributed to the crime levels.




Do you own your home?





How often do you gather or socialize with friends or neighborhood residents at activities in the neighborhood?












WCSO sponsors Ballin' in the Willow

We partnered with NWWNA & Washtenaw Public Health Department to convene a community conversation around health and safety on August 15. About 60 people met at New Covenant Missionary Baptist Church for healthy food and discussions around health concerns and solutions.









Shataura is working with West Willow residents to secure traffic calming devices throughout the neighborhood. Resident-led petitions for a traffic study are circulating on Nash & Chevrolet.

October

Two additional trash receptacles have been delivered to NWWNA to install with the help of Ypsilanti Township. We worked with NWWNA to help them apply for the AAABOR Placemaking Challenge Grant for improvements at West Willow Park to make it a more inviting space for families.

On October 20, 16 employees from the Lowe's store on Carpenter Road in Ypsilanti volunteered to do some work at the West Willow Community Resource Center. They provided \$2500 worth of materials and built & painted new picnic tables, built a new storage shed, assembled new tools & equipment, installed new planters with flowers and installed new lighting at the community pavilion. January

• The NWWNA received a grant from Washtenaw County Public Health to install lighting and electrical outlets in the pavilion.

April & May

• Habitat, in partnership with NWWNA, submitted proposal for a \$40,000 Aging in Place grant with Lowe's for three projects in the West Willow community. Senior residents in West Willow who we have worked with in the past participated in the project planning process. We were selected to receive the grant!

June

• On June 17, we held an Exterior Home Improvement Day with over 30 volunteers working on four different homes with projects including: gutter cleaning/gutter guard installation, fence painting, downspouts and extensions installation, back yard clean up, landscaping, minor repairs, and more! This day was made possible by both Washtenaw County Public Health and the Ann Arbor Area Community Foundation and of course the leadership of the new West Willow Neighborhood Association!

July & August

- Habitat continues to meet with both NWWNA and the Lowe's team to make plans for the Lowe's Aging in Place Grant to determine the specifics of the projects and timeline
- Received grant funding from Michigan State Housing Development Authority to complete roof replacements and exterior home improvements on eight homes in West Willow! A mailing was sent to the entire neighborhood and we have been able to track information about the need for roofs in the neighborhood. Funding will also add new signage at the Community Resource Center.
- The annual West Willow Community Picnic on August 19th was a great time!















September

• Eight homeowners' roofs were replaced with funding from MSHDA!





• On September 23, Habitat partnered with Wells Fargo as part of the 100 Veteran's Project and worked on four veterans homes in the neighborhood. Projects included: painting a garage, staining a porch, installing gutter guards, installing handrail on ramp, yard clean-up, planting flowers & landscaping. Wells Fargo volunteers worked alongside the residents and their families on a hot summer day!











• Through meetings with the NWWNA and brainstorming sessions at monthly neighborhood meetings, the Safe Neighbors Initiative has kicked off as a similar program to the former Citizens Patrol. The goal of the group is to increase safety through canvassing efforts, distribution of home safety items including "Drive Like Your Kids Live Here" lawn signs for residents.

October & November

A number of community volunteer days were held at the Community Resource Center in
order to being clearing out the space. Volunteers included residents as well as the WCSO
community work program. Volunteers also started on projects such as interior painting,
installing new window treatments, and installing new furniture in the newly organized
space.





• On October 24, Lowe's Centric Day took place at the Community Resource Center – Lowe's employees worked to assemble a shed for the new tool lending library and built two new raised garden beds with seating. The seating around the edge of the garden beds will allow residents, including seniors, to be able to garden without having to be low to the ground. We are currently getting input from residents about what items to stock in the tool lending library and forming guidelines for using it. Members of the community are working with Growing Hope on planning ideas for the community garden for next year.











• Exterior Home Improvement Days (October 6th and 13th) were held at the eight homes in West Willow where the roof replacements were completed. Volunteers from Cintas and Hyundai participated to complete projects such as: replacing a fence, hauling dirt to fill an old swimming pool hole, cleaning awnings, lots of landscaping, gutters/gutter guards, and garage repair.











December

- Through funding from MSHDA and the Lowe's AIP Grant the CRC has undergone a complete transformation! We have been working with residents and with the Washtenaw County Sherriff's Work Program volunteers to: paint all interior rooms, de-clutter and completely clean out the building, make minor repairs, install new window treatments, install new carpeting in one room, install new doors, and more.
- As a part of the Safe Neighbors Initiative, we have been distributing NWWNA t-shirts and tote bags. Another project under Safe Neighbors is a resident survey for folks to select from the following list what safety items they would be interested in receiving for their home: solar LED flood light, door security bar, window/door alarm kit, wireless driveway alert kit, plug-in carbon monoxide detector, decoy security camera, 24 hour timer, fire extinguisher and flashlight.
- The tool-lending library will soon be stocked with a variety of yard/lawn care, household repair, garden, and power tools. Residents have provided input as to which tools would be most useful to have access to.

• New signs at the Community Resource Center have been designed and installed, giving the New West Willow Neighborhood Association a more prominent identity to the public.





He also distributed an info packet on West Willow and the neighborhood association, with the goal of having 'connectors' throughout the neighborhood who participate in safety efforts and community communication.





Home safety items include window/door alarm, solar flood light, CO detector, fire extinguisher, decoy security camera, door/window security bar, driveway alert kit, and 24-hour outlet timer.

April & May

Ypsilanti Township Parks and Recreation, Washtenaw County Health Department, the New West Willow Neighborhood Association and Habitat started activities related to the grant funding to make improvements to the West Willow Park. Residents of West Willow have been asked to complete a survey about the park to find out why people do or do not use the park, how it used, and what changes residents would like to see at the park through this project. We also completed observations surveys to determine baseline usage at the park, finalized the activities to take place, and on May 19, 2018 at Ypsi Proud day we planted flowers at the park entrance as well as worked in the community garden and the grounds of the Community Resource Center and community garden.
















June - August 2018

September 2018

Activities were completed in the Building Healthy
Communities Grant through Washtenaw County Health
Department. Ypsilanti Township Parks & Recreation, New
West Willow Neighborhood Association and Habitat
partnered up to improved facilities at West Willow Park.
The grant provided funding for two new West Willow Park
signs with distance noted for the walking path, three new
picnic tables, six new trash cans, mulch around the play
area, and staining the flower planters.



On Saturday September 15, 28 volunteers contributed 159.5 hours in the Thrivent Building on Faith Day in West Willow. We completed exterior improvements at one homeowner's home, weeded the playground area and stained planters at West Willow Park, cleaned up and planted mums at the neighborhood entrance sign sites, gave the three neighborhood Little Free Libraries a fresh paint job and a little maintenance, and painted a shed and did general clean-up around the West Willow Community Resource Center. We also had three dumpsters available at New Covenant Missionary Baptist Church where neighborhood residents could dispose of unwanted items. We scheduled pick-ups for residents who were unable to transport their items on their own. 37 truck loads and trailer loads of junk was disposed of, and the dumpsters were full by the
